• our parents and guardians find a way to encourage them.





CFISD is expected to enroll more than 112.000 students in its 85 campuses for the 2013-2014 school year, as the district elevates one slot from the previous year to 24th among the largest school districts in the nation. It remains the third-largest district in Texas and the secondlargest district in the Gulf Coast region.

The district has grown by 38,910 students in the last decade and projects more than

10,000 over the next five years.

The student population reflects a diverse demographic in

northwest Harris County (figures 1 and 2), with at least 100 languages and dialects spoken.


As new families continue to move into the district amid a healing economy, CFISD greets a growing number of new faces through its

campus doors. The district had 24,801 first-time students in 2012-2013, reflecting a total of 2,592 new home closings in 2012 (figure 3). This

> number was up by 371 new home closings from the 2011 calendar year.

A demographics study conducted by Population and Survey Analysts (PASA) and presented to the Board of Trustees in June 2013 revealed CFISD to be among the fastest-growing districts in Houston (figure 4), expanding its student population by 13.6 percent from 2007-2012.

In the first year of the Texas Education Agency (TEA)'s new state accountability system, CFISD achieved the highest possible rating of *Met Standard*, along with all of its 80 eligible campuses. The designation makes CFISD the largest school district in the state to have 100 percent of its campuses earn *Met Standard* honors (*figure 8*).

CFISD's students are well-equipped for life beyond high school. The district's Class of 2012 graduation and continuation/GED reception rates exceeded state averages (figure 5), while many students took advantage of dual-college credit opportunities through a partnership with Lone Star College—CyFair (figure 6).

CFISD *Met Standards* in all four performance indexes and earned well above state targets in the eligible areas of Student Achievement, Student Progress, Closing Performance Gaps and Postsecondary Readiness.

The district also met 80 out of 84 (95 percent) of the TEA's total system

safeguards in the areas of Performance Rates, Participation Rates and Graduation Rates.


Overall, CFISD demonstrated positive gains in the second full year of STAAR assessments (*figure 7*).

Fiscal Accountability

CFISD's commitment to efficiently serving its students and taxpayers was rewarded in May, when the Education Resource Group (ERG) rated CFISD the No. 1 district in Texas for financial and academic performance. According to ERG, CFISD spent \$163.4 million less than projected in 2012 (figure 9).

The Board passed the 2013-2014 budget in the amount of \$776,682,534 in June. Due to the passage of SB1 by the 83rd Texas



Legislature, an additional \$37.6 million was injected into the budget and 344 teaching positions were restored (figure 10). The Board also preserved the Local Optional Homestead Exemption (figure 11). benefitting district homeowners.

Bond **Update**

As developments continue to expand throughout the district's 186 square miles (figure 12),

the need continues for new campuses to be built in CFISD's western territory. Sue Gratehouse Pope Elementary School (No. 53) opened in the Bridgeland community in August, and David Anthony, Ed.D. Middle School (No. 18) will open in Towne Lake in August 2014 to serve students in fast-growth areas. Both schools were constructed



with funds from the 2007 bond referendum.

The 2007 Bond also funded summer renovation projects, which were valued at \$32.4 million but resulted in a cost of \$31.6 million, netting an approximate savings of \$834,000 (figure 13). The renovation project packages impacted 36 campuses and 10

support facilities.

One of the renovation highlights is the expansion of the Ben D. Bradley Security Center, which is receiving an 8,000-square-foot addition and a new parking lot to accommodate the CFISD Police Department. The project is expected to be completed in January 2014.





CFISD students are keeping pace with the fast-paced, technologically advanced world around them by using many of the same devices used at home. As early as kindergarten, students are utilizing laptops, tablets and SMART boards to gain an edge in the classroom. Students in industrial technology, automotive education and agriculture science classes are using advanced equipment that will provide a smooth transition to postsecondary careers.

The students showcase their technological prowess each year at the Student Technology Festival. In May, more than 1,100 student projects were featured for more than 4,000 guests at the Berry Center.

CFISD was one of five school districts to pilot the TEA technology program Project Share in 2010, starting with 15 campuses



in 2010. Now, all campuses currently utilize the student resources, professional development courses, academic networking and professional learning communities that the program provides (figure 14).

Health and Safety

The health and safety of students remains a top priority in CFISD.

In an effort to bolster student safety, the district's year-old police department added five additional command staff, 11 additional officers with 18 new or repurposed vehicles, increasing those totals to 12, 86 (including support staff) and 64, respectively (figure

Additionally, the campus safety and facilities planning and construction teams have worked collaboratively to proactively safeguard district schools. As newer campuses have been designed with security access control systems in mind, newly renovated campuses have received or are in the process of receiving these upgrades, accounting for 73 campuses (figure 16).

The health services department employs 85 registered nurses (one per campus), four licensed vocational nurses and 14 clinic assistants to monitor student health. The department offers regular CPR certification classes to employees, and taught CPR to 5,510 individuals in 2012-2013 (figure 17).

A total of 244 automated external defibrillators (AEDs) are located throughout CFISD campuses for emergency situations, while the athletic department offered 5,145 electrocardiogram (ECG) screenings to monitor athlete heart conditions.



CFISD continues to build positive relationships with the surrounding community, which places a high value on public education. The Cy-Fair Educational Foundation (CFEF)—ranked 15th in the nation in supporting education by a Dewey & Associates 2012 study (figure 19)—raised nearly \$300,000 to go toward student scholarships in 2012-2013 through events like the 25th annual B.F. Adam Golf Classic and the Salute to the Stars Gala.

In 2013, CFISD placed an increased focus on community relations through the formation of a communication and community relations department—consisting of the communication, Partners in Education and community programs teams. The community programs team coordinates



CFISD's before- and after-school program, Club Rewind, which has seen a 35-percent increase since its formation (figure 18). The team, which also runs the swim-lesson program Splash!, ROPES courses, Early Learning Centers and summer fun camps, has generated \$4.3 million in district

The Partners in Education team had a host of nearly 19,000 volunteers contributing to student success in 2012-2013, and has forged nearly 2,600 business partnerships in addition to 45 "adoptions" through the Adopt-a-School Program (figure 20).

The communication team acts as a liaison to keep the media and community informed of district news and points of interest. The team has formed a concentrated focus on social media in 2013, with strong online presence through a variety of mediums (figure 21).






